Cool Merino Big Scarf

I live in Eindhoven, a city in the Netherlands and started crocheting in March 2022. After finishing my first amigurumi, more adorable creatures had to follow. Pretty soon, I got the hang of it and discovered the challenge behind designing your own amigurumi. With that, 'Jelly the Jellyfish' was born as my first self-made design. Shortly after, at the end of 2022, I discovered the crochet technique mosaic overlay. I love what you can do with a bit of yarn and a crochet needle!

Difficulty

Easy

General

This pattern is an adjusted pattern based on a principle shown by a friend. The adjustment is personal choice due to the yarn I wanted to use for this scarf, namely Lana Grossa Cool Merino Big. If you use another yarn type of 50gr/90m, it can look better to crochet 4 chains instead of 3 to start a new row, just try it out!

Dimensions

The long edge of the scarf will become 230cm and the height 80cm.

Materials

10 skeins of Lana Grossa Cool Merino Big

- The color of the scarf on the front-page is 218 (Light Grey)
- The color of the yarn in the step-by-step images is 212 (Dark red)

Other materials or tools

- Crochet needle 8 mm, and a smaller one to
- Scissors, to cut off the small amount of left-over yarn

Abbreviations

mr = magic ring

st = stitch

ch = chain

dc = double crochet

trc = triple crochet


dc 2 + trc = 2 dc and 1 trc in 1 stitch (increase)

3) = round number or number of rows


[12] = number of stitches after finishing the round

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1) start with a magic ring: ch 3 and dc 4 in the mr, see images 1 to 6 [5]



2) ch 3, turn, then in the first st: dc 2, dc in the following st, dc 3 in the one after (this is the middle of your scarf), again dc in the next st, followed by a dc 2 + trc in the last chain stitch of the previous row. See images 7 to 12 [11]



- 3) ch 3, turn, then in the first st: dc 2, dc in the following 4 st, dc 3, dc in the following 4 st, in the last chain stitch: dc 2 + trc [17]
- 4) ch 3, turn, then in the first st: dc 2, dc in the following 7 st, dc 3, dc in the following 7 st, in the last chain stitch: dc + trc = 23

Continue as you go. The number of 1 double crochet in 1 stitch increases by 3 for each row you crochet. Below, you see the scarf drawn in a crochet diagram.
